Professor Susan Garthus Niegel

Assembling the puzzle pieces: Integrating different perspectives and methodologies in family mental health research

Susan Garthus-Niegel is a psychologist and professor at the MSH Medical School Hamburg, Faculty of Medicine. She also holds part-time positions at the Norwegian Institute of Public Health and the University of Dresden, where she heads the Public Mental Health Research Unit. She and her team conduct epidemiological cohort studies, systematic reviews and meta-analyses on the mental health and well-being of women and families, e.g., during the perinatal period, in relation to work-life balance or domestic violence.



SRIP 2023 KEYNOTE SPEAKER

Professor Carolina de Weerth

Perinatal psychological stress: Underlying mechanisms and de-stressing factors

Carolina de Weerth is a developmental psychobiologist and Full Professor at Radboud University Medical Center and the Donders Institute for Brain, Cognition & Behaviour (The Netherlands). Her research focuses on early development, from pregnancy until adolescence, and in community and vulnerable populations. In particular, her research investigates: 1) the influences of prenatal maternal stress and anxiety on child development; 2) the development of the Hypothalamic Pituitary Adrenal (HPA) axis in children, in relation to their behavioural and emotional regulation. Environmental influences studied in this context are parental behaviour, co-sleeping, breastfeeding, and non-parental care; and 3) the development of the intestinal microbiota in relation to children's behavioural and emotion regulation, and their HPA axis development.

Professor Livio Provenzi

A psychobiological journey into human togetherness

Livio Provenzi is a psychologist, psychotherapist, and researcher at the University of Pavia (Italy). He coordinates the Developmental Psychobiology Lab (**www.devpsychobiology.com**) of the Mondino Foundation in Pavia. By integrating methodologies from infant research, neuroendocrinology, and behavioural epigenetic, his research is aimed at discovering the psychobiological foundation of human innate togetherness nature and the fundamental role of parenting for cognitive, social, and emotional development during the first thousand days of life in healthy and at-risk infants

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

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
